Team Trials - 2012



On Sunday May 6th, the annual AIOC Team Challenge event was held at Beban Park in Nanaimo. There were a total of 20 teams entered representing nine clubs in three separate competitions - three dogs/three classes, two dogs/two classes and two dogs/same class. NOSA's teams did extremely well in representing our club.

The three dogs/three classes competition was won by a team from the Cowichan Dog Club comprised of Cathy Mawdsley with Odin, Jim Deptuch with Marquissa and Diane Henn with Jet with a total score of 469.5 out of 600. There were two teams entered in this competition.



The two dogs/two classes competition was won by our own NOSA team comprised of Heather Alexander with Colby and Lynn Erskine with Stirling with a total score of 386.5 out of 400 narrowly edging out a team from Lakewood by one point. There were six teams entered in this competition.



The two dogs/same class competition ended up in a tie between a team from Cowichan comprised of Cathy Mawdsley with Portia and Catherine Dunstan with Desi and our team from NOSA comprised of Heather Alexander with Finn and Norah Shandley with Clancy. Their score was 385.5 out of 400 well ahead of the third place team.



Our second team in this event comprised of Gloria MacLucas with Taffy and Elizabeth Skaggs with Juno placed a respectable eighth out of twelve with a score of 331.5 out of 400.

Each of the AIOC clubs took responsibility for one of the tasks associated with the Challenge and NOSA's was to run the raffle in conjunction with the Island and Pacific Labrador Retriever Club. I am pleased to say that the raffle was a roaring success



bringing in over \$500 to help cover the costs of the event.

new Herding Champion & new Duel Champion Zephyr



May 19th at Downriver Farm in Hope, BC, Zephyr completed his **Herding Championship Arena** (& hence also his Canadian **Duel Championship**) titles with a score of 98 for a 3-pt major, High In Class; and Reserve High In Trial!

Zephyr is the 1st Collie (Rough/Smooth) to attain either a Herding Championship or a Duel Championship – he's actually a Triple CKC Champion but CKC doesn't acknowledge that accomplishment.

There are 3 types of Herding Championships: HChA (Herding Champion Arena), HChSD (Herding Champion Stock Dog) and HChT (Herding Champion Tending). To earn a HCh you must earn:

- (a) 15 championship pts (points depend upon the number of competitors defeated) and they must be earned on the same course type (Arena, Stock Dog or Tending), subsequent to earning an Advanced title in that course type.
- (b) Two 1st placements (where Championship points are earned) earned under different judges and at least one 1st placement must be a 3 pts major or more.
- (c) Not more than 3 Championship pts can be earned on ducks.

For a DCh (Duel Champion) a dog requires a Championship in a non-herding CKC event and a Herding Championship.

Zephyr also earned his 7th Herding Excellent sheep Q. (For HX a dog requires 10 scores of 85 or more in Advanced, under at least 3 judges, with a maximum of 3 scores earned on ducks.

Zephyr is now formally known as *OTCh, HChA, ATChC, V.Ch., Am.Ch. & BISS Can.DCh. **Signet's "Way To Go!" Woodruff, Can.(DD, HA, SDA, AgX, AgXJ, RE), Am.(CDX, HSAs,/// XRE, NA, NAJ), STDsd, HRDII, RLFII, HTADI, Bronze AOM, ExStBronze, ExGBronze, ExJBronze, ExSBronze, BVA, MSCDC, EAC, TN-E, TG-O, OCC, OJC, WV-N, HP-N, RXMCL, CGC, CRTX, VX, AOM***

COFFEE FILTERS (Better than paper towels)



1. Cover bowls or dishes when cooking in the microwave.
2. Clean windows, mirrors, and chrome... Coffee filters are lint-free so they'll leave windows sparkling.
3. Protect China by separating your good dishes with a coffee filter between each dish.
4. Filter broken cork from wine. If you break the cork when opening a wine bottle, filter the wine through a coffee filter.
5. Protect a cast-iron skillet. Place a coffee filter in the skillet to absorb moisture and prevent rust.
6. Apply shoe polish. Ball up a lint-free coffee filter.
7. Recycle frying oil. After frying, strain oil through a sieve lined with a coffee filter.
8. Weigh chopped foods. Place chopped ingredients in a coffee filter on a kitchen scale.
9. Hold tacos. Coffee filters make convenient wrappers for messy foods.
10. Stop the soil from leaking out of a plant pot. Line a plant pot with a coffee filter to prevent the soil from going through the drainage holes
11. Prevent a Popsicle from dripping. Poke one or two holes as needed in a coffee filter.
12. Do you think we used expensive strips to wax eyebrows? Use strips of coffee filters
13. Put a few in a plate and put your fried bacon, French fries, chicken fingers, etc on them.. It soaks out all the grease
14. Keep in the bathroom. They make great "razor nick fixers"
15. As a sewing backing. Use a filter as an easy-to-tear backing for embroidering soft fabrics.
16. Put baking soda into a coffee filter and insert into shoes or a closet to absorb or prevent odors.
17. Use them to strain soup stock and to tie fresh herbs in to put in soups and stews.
- 18 Use a coffee filter to prevent spilling when you add fluids to your car..
19. Use them as a spoon rest while cooking and clean up small counter spills.
20. Can use to hold dry ingredients when baking or when cutting a piece of fruit or veggies. Saves on having extra bowls to wash.
21. Use them to wrap Christmas ornaments for storage
22. Use them to remove fingernail polish when out of cotton balls.
23. Use them to sprout seeds. Simply dampen the coffee filter, place seeds inside, fold it and place it into a zip-lock plastic bag until they sprout.
24. Use coffee filters as blotting paper for pressed flowers. Place the flowers between two coffee filters and put the coffee filters in phone book.
25. Use as a disposable "snack bowl" for popcorn, chips, etc.
26. Great in the tool room when separating nails and screws then use in to bottom of containers to remove moisture and prevent rust.
